And if his offering be of the flocks, namely, of the sheep, or of the goats, for a burnt sacrifice; he shall bring it a male without blemish. And he shall kill it on the side of the altar northward before the Lord: and the priests, Aaron's sons, shall sprinkle his blood round about upon the altar. And he shall cut it into his pieces, with his head and his fat: and the priest shall lay them in order on the wood that is on the fire which is upon the altar: But he shall wash the inwards and the legs with water: and the priest shall bring it all, and burn it upon the altar: it is a burnt sacrifice, an offering made by fire, of a sweet savour unto the Lord.

And the priest shall bring it unto the altar, and wring off his head, and burn it on the altar; and the blood thereof shall be wrung out at the side of the altar: And he shall pluck away his crop with his feathers, and cast it beside the altar on the east part, by the place of the ashes: And he shall cleave it with the wings thereof, but shall not divide it asunder: and the priest shall burn it upon the altar, upon the wood that is upon the fire: it is a burnt sacrifice, an offering made by fire, of a sweet savour unto the Lord.

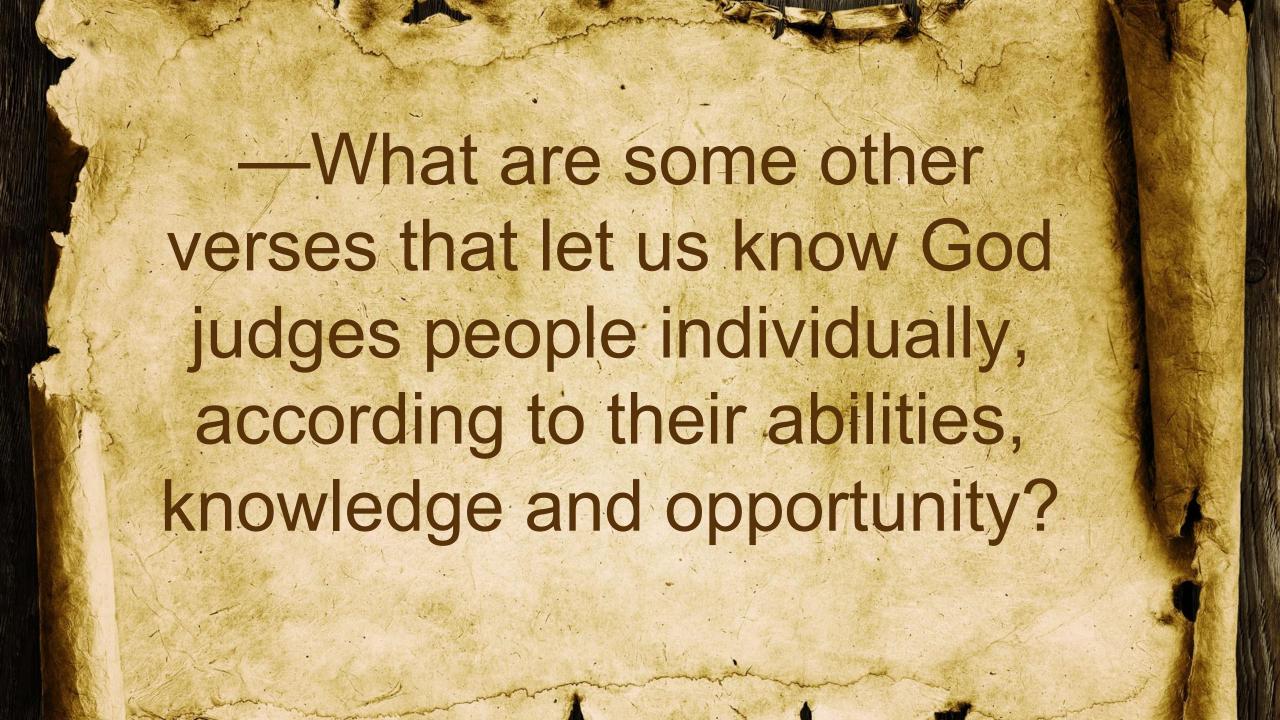

And when any will offer a meat offering unto the Lord, his offering shall be of fine flour; and he shall pour oil upon it, and put frankincense thereon: And he shall bring it to Aaron's sons the priests: and he shall take thereout his handful of the flour thereof, and of the oil thereof, with all the frankincense thereof; and the priest shall burn the memorial of it upon the altar, to be an offering made by fire, of a sweet savour unto the Lord: And the remnant of the meat offering shall be Aaron's and his sons': it is a thing most holy of the offerings of the Lord made by fire. And if thou bring an oblation of a meat offering baken in the oven, it shall be unleavened cakes of fine flour mingled with oil, or unleavened wafers anointed with oil. Leviticus 2:1–16

And if thy oblation be a meat offering baken in a pan, it shall be of fine flour unleavened, mingled with oil. Thou shalt part it in pieces, and pour oil thereon: it is a meat offering. And if thy oblation be a meat offering baken in the fryingpan, it shall be made of fine flour with oil. And thou shalt bring the meat offering that is made of these things unto the Lord: and when it is presented unto the priest, he shall bring it unto the altar. And the priest shall take from the meat offering a memorial thereof, and shall burn it upon the altar: it is an offering made by fire, of a sweet savour unto the Lord. And that which is left of the meat offering shall be Aaron's and his sons': it is a thing most holy of the offerings of the Lord made by fire.

Leviticus 2:1–16

No meat offering, which ye shall bring unto the Lord, shall be made with leaven: for ye shall burn no leaven, nor any honey, in any offering of the Lord made by fire. As for the oblation of the firstfruits, ye shall offer them unto the Lord: but they shall not be burnt on the altar for a sweet savour. And every oblation of thy meat offering shalt thou season with salt; neither shalt thou suffer the salt of the covenant of thy God to be lacking from thy meat offering: with all thine offerings thou shalt offer salt. And if thou offer a meat offering of thy firstfruits unto the Lord, thou shalt offer for the meat offering of thy firstfruits green ears of corn dried by the fire, even corn beaten out of full ears. And thou shalt put oil upon it, and lay frankincense thereon: it is a meat offering. And the priest shall burn the memorial of it, part of the beaten corn thereof, and part of the oil thereof, with all the frankincense thereof: it is an offering made by fire unto the Lord.

Fine Flour — *Torah* Significance

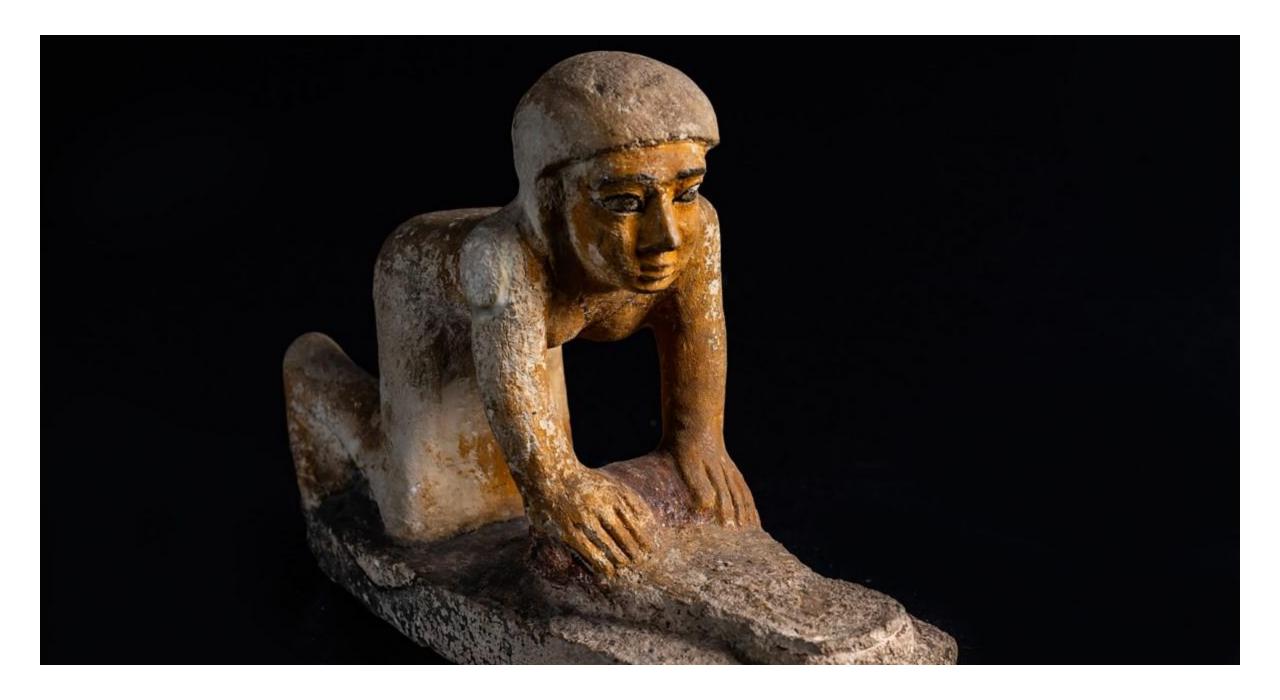
The Base of Grain Offerings: Fine flour was the primary ingredient in grain offerings (Leviticus 2), representing the fruit of human labor dedicated to God, offered either unbaked, baked, or fried, and always paired with oil and frankincense.

A Sacrifice for the Poor: Ensuring that atonement was accessible to all — even the poorest.

Symbol of Purity and Refinement: The Hebrew term implies well-sifted, pure flour — free of chaff or coarseness — symbolizing purity, devotion, and the best one could offer to God.

<u>Used in Tabernacle Provisions and Festivals</u>: Fine flour was also used in daily offerings (Exodus 29:40) and festival rituals (e.g., unleavened bread at Passover), highlighting its role in continual worship and communal sanctity.





Olive Oil — *Torah* Significance

Tabernacle Lampstand Fuel: Only the purest olive oil was commanded as the fuel for the eternal lamp (Exodus 27:20–21; Leviticus 24:1–2), symbolizing God's presence, guidance, and holiness continually dwelling with Israel. Essential to Grain Offerings: Olive oil was mixed with or poured over grain offerings (e.g., Leviticus 2) to signify consecration, blessing, and richness representing God's provision and the anointing of what was being offered. **Used in Purification Rituals:** Olive oil was applied in cleansing rituals for lepers and Nazirites (Leviticus 14, Numbers 6), symbolizing healing, restoration, and reintegration into the covenant community. **Symbol of Anointing and Divine Appointment:** While the Torah doesn't narrate many anointings, it prescribes anointing oil made with olive oil (Exodus 30:22–33) for consecrating priests, the tabernacle, and holy vessels, marking them as set apart for God's service — a theme later extended to kings and prophets.

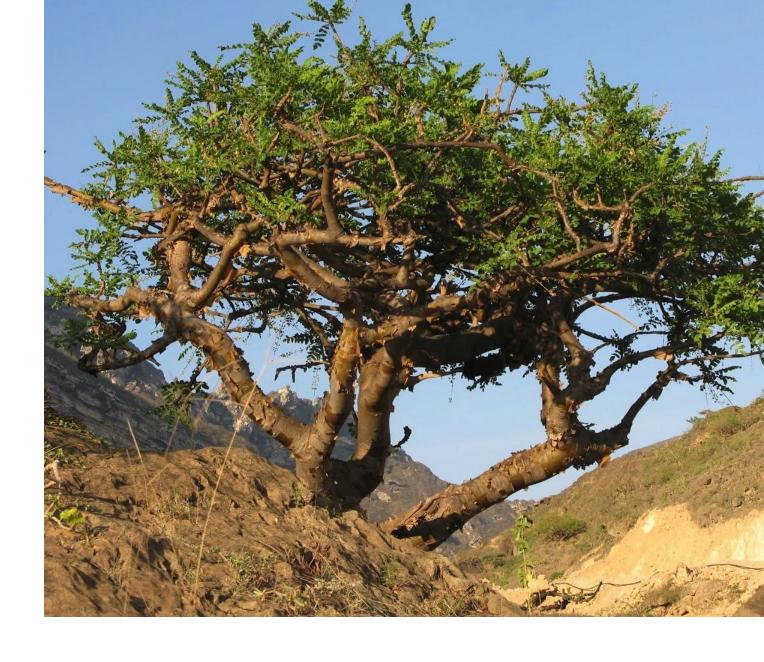

Frankincense — *Torah* Significance

- A Symbol of Worship and Devotion: A fragrant resin burned to produce sweet-smelling smoke, symbolizing prayers, reverence, and honor rising up to God.
- A Required Part of Grain Offerings: Added to grain offerings, where only the frankincense was entirely burned on the altar, emphasizing God's portion alone a sacred act of pure worship.
- **Associated with the Holy Place and Priesthood:** Included in the **holy incense blend** used on the **golden altar of incense** in the tabernacle (Exodus 30:34), connecting it directly to the **priestly ministry and intercession**.
- **Excluded from Sin Offerings:** Never used in sin offerings (e.g., Leviticus 5:11), reinforcing that **atonement for sin** was not about fragrance or beauty, but about **blood, repentance, and substitution**.

I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service.

Salt — *Torah* Significance: A Covenant of Salt

Required in All Offerings: Commanded to be included with every grain offering, symbolizing purity, preservation, and the enduring nature of the covenant between God and Israel.

A Symbol of Covenant Loyalty: Referred to as the "salt of the covenant" (Leviticus 2:13), it represented faithfulness, permanence, and sacred agreement, much like ancient Near Eastern treaties sealed by sharing salt. Connected to God's Provision and Promises: Described as a "covenant of salt" in connection with the priesthood (Numbers 18:19) and Davidic kingship (2 Chronicles 13:5), highlighting God's unbreakable, enduring commitments.

Never to Be Omitted from Worship: The command to "not let the salt of the covenant be lacking" (Lev 2:13) underscores that **no offering was** acceptable without it, stressing its essential role in **sanctifying gifts** to God.

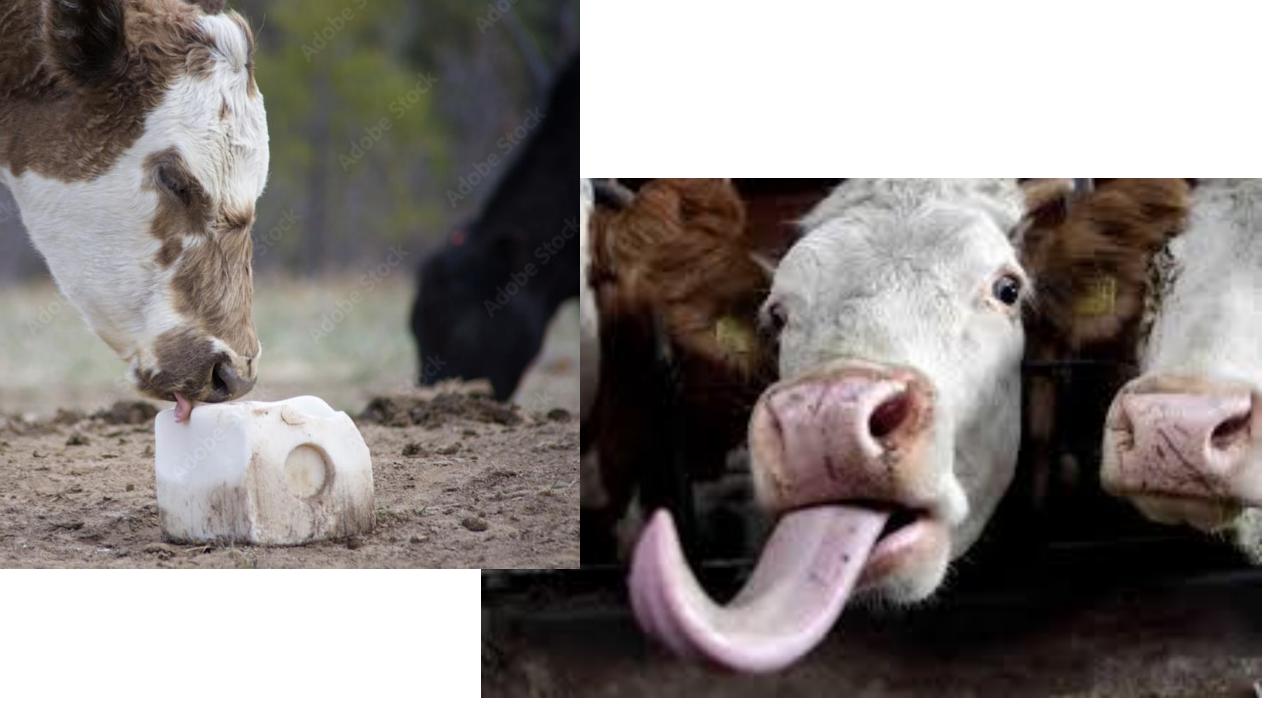


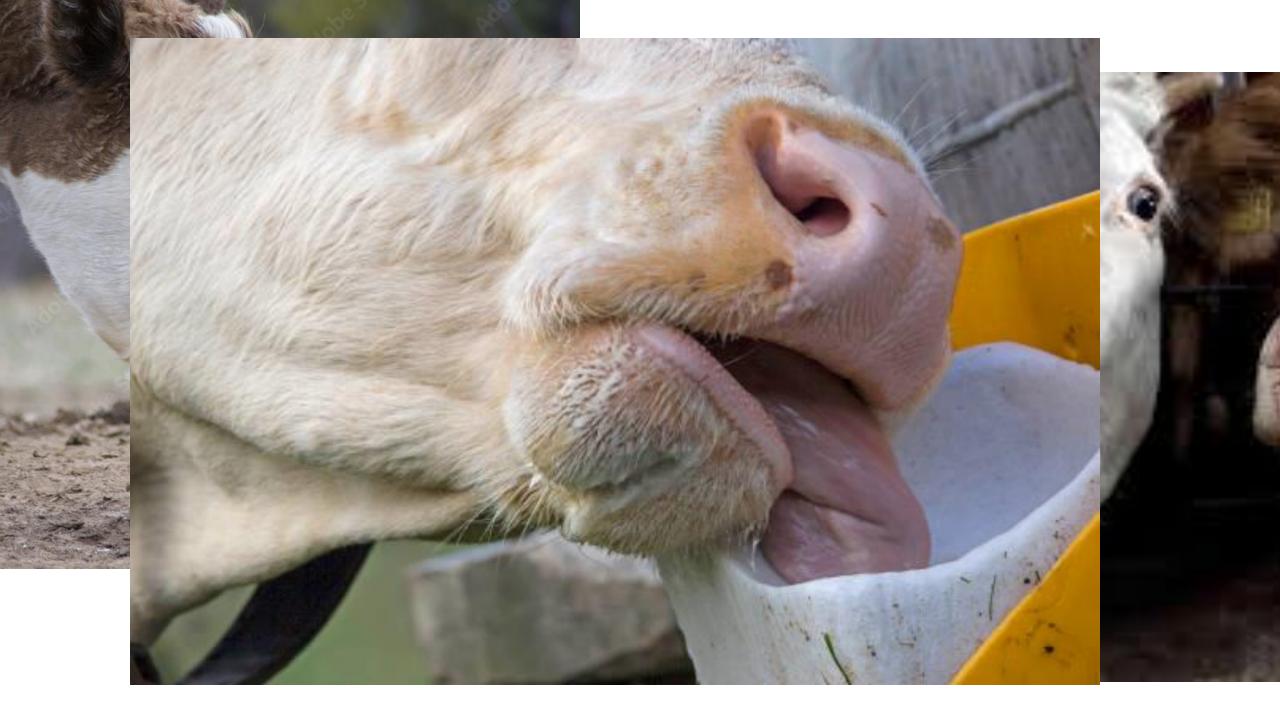

SCIENCE BEHIND SOURDOUGH

Sourdough starter contains wild yeast and lactic acid bacteria.

BACTERIA

The bacteria produce acid which prevents other harmful microbes from thriving. This is the magic of sourdough starter!

This lactic acid is what gives sourdough its tang! It's the same bacteria that sours milk, yoghurt and produces sauerkraut!

Sourdough bread molds more slowly than commercially yeasted bread because of the acids it contains. It's the oldest known form of leavened bread!

DID

YOU KNOW?

YEAST

Wild yeast come from the flour, environment & baker's hands! Only acid tolerant yeasts can coexist with the bacteria!

FLOUR

You can use any grain based flour to produce a starter. Organic flours have the most wild yeast available. Rye is also great.

WATER

Water needs to be chlorine free and full of nutrients to help the bacteria and yeast do their jobs.



Yeast feed on the sugar and starches in the flour to produce C02 gas. It's this gas that causes the dough to rise and produces the open crumb structure (called alveoli) that sourdough is famous for!



There are at least 50 strains of bacteria and 20 strains of wild yeast in a typical sourdough starter! This makes it much more aromatic and flavorful than baking with commercial yeast!
